



PARKS UPDATES

<u>Martha Burton Community Park</u> - Construction on the new playground will start this Fall.

<u>Sapovits</u> - A walking path from the basketball courts to the playground will be installed, along with minor playground improvements. Additionally, a stormwater quality improvement project will be taking place in the fall.

Gouley Park - The Township is working with local athletic groups for the goal of installing a multi-purpose turf field at the site. Along with that, 40-50 evergreen trees will be planted.



Movies in the Park - We had two successful events in 2023 – one in Hepford Park and one in Sapovits Park. Movies in the Park will return in 2024!

Support our local park with a "Love our Parks" yard sign, which can be purchased at the Township building for \$10 during business hours.

TRIBUTE TO DARRYL DIXION

Have you ever met someone that everyone liked and loved? That was Darryl Dixon. The Township lost an amazing person on July 8, 2023 when Darryl passed away after battling an illness. He served the Township for over 33 years, first as a Public Works Laborer, then as the Assistant Public Works Director, and then as Public Works Director. Arguably the most important person in the Township, Darryl led countless projects that made the community a better place. Whether you realize it or not, everywhere you look in the Township has seen the benefits of his work. He was always called "the Best Public Works Director around".

Darryl was a kind, generous, loving person. His easy-going personality brightened everyone's day. He treated everyone with respect, and that's because he cared deeply about everyone. Most important, he was an amazing father, husband, and friend. He has made a lasting impact on the lives of so many in Nether Providence. Darryl, we are lucky to have known you. Your Nether Providence family will forever miss you.

Love for the late Darryl Dixon Sr. was fully displayed during a Life Celebration at Sapovits Park in the heart of South Media on Saturday, July 22. Family and friends gathered on

and around the basketball courts where the lifelong stellar sportsman played personally, and as Director of the Nether Providence Township Public Works Department, took great pride in overseeing the upkeep to ensure enjoyment for all.

"Whether you realize it or not, everywhere you look in the township has seen the benefits of his work," reads a portion of the message on the township website posted soon after Dixon's death on July 8 following an illness. A 33-year employee of the Township, the married father of five children was 58.

Family members donned in blue – a favorite color of Dixon's - processed from the nearby Dixon home to the park, sunkissed and brimming with colleagues past and present in areas including government, education, fire service, and law enforcement, among others.

YARD WASTE

The Township Public Works Department collects yard waste on the second Tuesday of each month.

You MUST call the Township to get on the list to have your yard waste picked up.

Simply call 610-566- 4516 Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. – 5 p.m., and provide your address.

Call early as pick-ups can fill up!

- Limbs and branches must not be greater than 4" in diameter and no longer than 5'. They should be bundled together with twine
- All items must be placed at the edge of your property, curbside.
 The employees cannot come onto your property to pick up the items.
- If you choose to bag items, they must be in a paper biodegradable bag. NO PLASTIC BAGS OR PLASTIC BIODEGRADABLE BAGS.
- Logs, stumps, and branches larger than the parameters above WILL NOT be collected. You'll have to arrange for a tree company or your trash hauler to take those items.

NOT accepted: Grass clippings, vines, ivy, and weeds. These clog and break the mulch machines.

Subject to change during the construction at the Public Works Garage. Please check the website for information.

NPPD NEWS Chief Splain recognized as a 'Patriotic Employer'

For supporting one of his officer's commitments to the Pennsylvania Army National Guard, Nether Providence Police Chief David Splain received the "Patriotic Employer" award at the Board of Commissioners meeting on Aug. 10.

The award is administered through the Office of the Secretary of Defense Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve. It reflects the efforts made to support an individual supervisor, a citizen warrior, through various measures, including flexible schedules, time off before and after deployment, caring for families, and granting leave of absence if necessary.

In nominating his supervisor and Chief, Michael Worrell, a township patrol officer for seven years and 14-year veteran of the National Guard rising to the rank of staff sergeant, described Splain's support as "above and beyond," a backing he appreciates and recognizes that not all of his military peers receive.

"His support allows me to transition seamlessly between my police career and my military career," Officer Worrell said.

Noting that half of the country's military are members of the reserves' forces, Officer Worrell said, "It is important that our employers support us."

Chief Splain said he was both surprised and humbled by the award.

"I give you a lot of credit," he said to Worrell, citing his abilities to balance careers, single fatherhood and new home ownership. Chief Splain has always supported the military, but having a son on active duty raised his understanding. Like himself, Sgt. Patrick Fisher, who was in the audience, and Officer Steve Kilian also have sons serving in the Army, he told the group.

"Thank you," Chief Splain said in closing, drawing a standing ovation.

Commissioner Robert O'Connor publicly thanked Officer Worrell, who also received a standing ovation.

"You are an asset to our community and our country," O'Connor said of Worrell.

TSO SMITH IS OFFICER OF THE YEAR

Traffic Safety Officer Kevin Smith is Officer of the Year for the Nether Providence Township Police Department.

The annual award is named in memory of Detective Sgt. Raymond L. White who suffered a heart attack while collecting evidence at the scene of a homicide on April 10, 1983, and died hours later.

TSO Smith, a 23-year veteran of the department who has been heading the Traffic Safety Unit for the past seven years, shows dedication and commitment every day, Chief Splain said in announcing his award.

The award is decided by a vote among peers in the department, most of whom were on hand, joining township leaders, family, friends, and others gathered in applauding the 2023 honoree.

In describing TSO Smith's daily role, Chief Splain said he has taken full ownership of the unit, the first in the recent history of the police department, building it into what he considers "one of the finest and most complete" traffic safety units in the Philadelphia region.

More than that, Chief Splain said, 'He's just a good guy to have on your team."

It was a family affair at the Board of Commissioners meeting on March 23, as Detective Sgt. Erickson and Sgt. Markunas took their oaths, sworn in by Magisterial

ENVIRONMENTAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE- EAC

Are We Really Recycling? An explainer from your Environmental Advisory Committee (EAC).

Everyone has heard anecdotes about recycling being picked up with the trash and China rejecting imports of US recyclables. So what really happens when we carefully separate and set out our recycling bins for Township collection? The answer is that our efforts at separating recyclables really do help both the economy (recycling is less expensive than disposal) and ecology (recycling is better for the environment).

Nether Providence Township presently contracts with B&L Disposal to collect our recyclables and deliver 100% of the material to the Republic Services material recycling facility (MRF) in King of Prussia, PA. In addition to B&L's commitment to service our account per the contract, there is no incentive to dispose material elsewhere (they would have to pay for the disposal) and B&L does not pick up trash in NPT so there is no rushing and throwing it all in one truck.

Then what happens at the Republic MRF? Republic charges NPT a fee per ton to accept and sort our recyclables into 11 categories including cardboard, glass, aluminum cans, various plastic grades including PET (water bottles) and HDPE (milk jugs), and unrecyclable trash. They bale and sell the material and credit us 80% of the market value. The net cost per ton changes every month.

In one recent monthly calculation values of typical materials included a whopping \$1,091/ton for aluminum cans (but cans only make up 1-3% of the weight of recyclables), \$941/ton for HDPE milk jugs, \$141 for PET water bottles, \$33 for cardboard, negative \$74 for mixed glass (which unfortunately makes up 11-23% of the total weight), and negative \$90 for unrecyclable trash (which makes up 4-16% of the total weight).

Processed recycled glass was recently the hero of the I-95 emergency repair, but most glass presently goes to replacing clean soil as an alternative landfill cover. That is still far from the desired "circular economy" where glass and PET bottles are turned back into glass and PET bottles – not downscaled into road base and plastic park benches - but still better than disposal. Aluminum cans are turned into aluminum cans, and cardboard is turned into new cardboard.

As people work to improve the rest of the system, what can we individuals do?

Reduce/Reuse/Recycle - Buy less single-use stuff of any kind. Use your own shopping bag and refillable water bottle. Look for lighter and more recyclable packaging. NPT saves around 4 cents each time you drink your favorite beverage from an aluminum can instead of a (heavier and less valuable) glass bottle. Expanded polystyrene (XPS or Styrofoam®) packaging is generally not recyclable at all.

When In Doubt Throw It Out - Reduce the amount of unrecyclable waste and food contamination in the recycling stream. Republic just has to pick out the trash and charge us for it and the market value of their recyclables is affected by dirty materials. Any plastic bags including their contents are also unsortable and disposed. Processing is most efficient when recyclables are left loose, but if you really enjoy crushing your cans you can be allowed that small luxury.



STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

Clean Water Begins With You

What is Stormwater Runoff?



Stormwater runoff is precipitation from rain or snowmelt that flows over the ground, Impervious surfaces such as streets, sidewalks, and driveways prevent stormwater from soaking into the ground. As stormwater flows over ground, it can pick up chemicals, debris, dirt, and other pollutants that enter the storm severe surface.

Why is Stormwater Runoff a Concern?



Once pollutants from stormwater enter the storm sever system, they are discharged UNTREATED into local streams and waterways. These are the same bodies of water that we use for drinking, fishing, and recreation.

What are the effects of Stormwater?

Polluted stormwater can lead to an overall decline in stream health that results in a negative impact to fish, wildlife,and recreation.

- •Increased volumes of stormwater entering streams due to impervious surfaces, preventing infiltration and increasing runoff, can lead to erosion of stream and lake banks. This in turn results in large amounts of sediments entering our waterways. Higher volumes of water entering our waterbodies also leads to flooding.
- Sediments cloud water, making it difficult for equatic plants and animals to survive.
- ◆Excess nutrients, often a result of fertilizer runoff from our lawns, causes sigat blooms. When algae die and decompose, the process removes oxygen from the water. Fish and aquatic organisms cannot live in water with low oxygen levets.
- •Bacteria, often from dog waste left on the ground, can wash into local streams and create a health hazard.
- Debris and trash that is left on streets, sidewalks and parking lots is washed into our waterbodies degrading them aesthetically and harming wildlife that use the water as a home.
- •Pollution from stormwater degrades streams and waterways used for drinking water. This can affect public health and lead to increased costs to treat the water.





Storm Drains

Never dump anything down a storm drain especially used motor oil or antifeeze. Dispose of these properly at a local service station or approved recycling center. Encourage your community to steriol storm drains with "No Dumping, Drains to Croek" so others will know that everything that enters the storm sewer system also enters their local creeks.

Pet Waste

Pet waste can be a major source of excess nutrients and becteris to local waterbodies. It is important to always pick up after your pet and dispose of the waste property. When pet waste is length of the ground it increases public health risks.

What you can do to be part of the solution




Washing you can at home on the driveway or the street can send detergents and other contaminants through the storm sewer system. It is best to wash your dar at a commercial can wash where they treat and recycles the wastewater, if you do wash your can at home, do so in your yard so the water infiltrates into the ground.


Repair all car leaks. Fluid leaking from a car onto a paved surface is washed into the storm sewer system when it rains.




Streambank Landscaping

Erosion of streambanks can be prevented through the use of vegetated strips along the banks. Also known as riparian buffers, these strips of fall grasses, trees, and flowers act to stabilize banks, which prevents erosion and additional sediment load in the stream.









Rain Gardens or Grassy Swales – These specially designed gardens can be planted with native vegetation to provide an area for rainwater to collect and soak into the ground. Stormwater from rooftop drains and pavement areas can be directed to these vegetated areas.

HALLOWEEN FIRE SAFETY TIPS

- When choosing a costume, stay away from billowing or long trailing fabric. If your child is wearing a mask, make sure the eye holes are large enough so they can see out.
- → **Provide children** with flashlights to carry for lighting or glow sticks as part of their costume.
- Dried flowers, cornstalks and crepe paper are highly flammable. Keep these and other decorations well away from all open flames and heat sources, including light bulbs and heaters.
- → It is safest to use a flashlight or battery-operated candle in a jack-o-lantern. If you use a real candle, use extreme caution. Make sure children are watched at all time when candles are lit. When lighting candles inside jack-o-lanterns, use long, fireplace-style matches or a utility lighter. Be sure to place lit pumpkins well away from anything that can burn and far enough out of the way of trick-or-treaters, doorsteps, walkways and yards..
- Remember to keep exits clear of decorations so nothing blocks escape routes.
- Tell children to stay away from open flames. Be sure they know how to stop, drop and roll if their clothing catches fire. (Have them practice, stopping immediately, dropping to the ground, covering their face with their hands, and rolling over and over to put the flames out.)

Use flashlights as alternatives to candles or torch lights when decorating walkways and yards. They are much safer for trick-or-treaters, whose costumes may brush against the lighting.

If your children are going to Halloween parties at others' homes, have them look for ways out of the home and plan how they would get out in an emergency.

Did you know?

Decorations are the first thing to ignite in 1,000 reported home fires each year.
